

Grow in Mystery

This Sunday's gospel offers us an opportunity to reflect on how the kingdom of God is cultivated in our lives. Jesus speaks about the Kingdom in parables, comparing it to the life cycle of a plant. Once a seed is sown in the land, it begins to sprout and grow. But the man who plants the seed cannot account for each stage of its growth. Our own lives are similarly mysterious: although we allow the seeds of faith to be planted and watered through prayer, sacraments, and charitable activity, we cannot see every step of the process that God is working in our hearts. Therefore, like the farmer, we must be patient through the various seasons of our lives. It can be tempting to believe that if we just work hard enough, we can achieve a good life or even our own salvation; Jesus' words remind us that although we must participate in planting the seeds of faith in our life, ultimately it is also God's work, His grace poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit. We must trust that he will guide our hearts over time, cultivating even our smallest seeds of faith to become eventually "the biggest shrub of them all."

Similarly, Fr. Teilhard de Chardin once wrote, "Above all, trust in the slow work of God. We are quite naturally impatient in everything to reach the end without delay. We should like to skip the intermediate stages. We are impatient of being on the way to something unknown, something new. And yet it is the law of all progress that it is made by passing through some stages of instability—and that it may take a very long time. And so I think it is with you; your ideas mature gradually—let them grow, let them shape themselves, without undue haste. Don't try to force them on, as though you could be today what time (that is to say, grace and circumstances acting on your own good will) will make of you tomorrow. Only God could say what this new spirit gradually forming within you will be. Give Our Lord the benefit of believing that his hand is leading you, and accept the anxiety of feeling yourself in suspense and incomplete."
