aithfulness is manifest in song; the righteous make a merry noise. "Sing unto the Lord, O ye saints, and give thanks at the remembrance of his holiness", exhorts Psalm 30, in a sentiment capturing the very essence of the Book of Psalms itself.

Silence, on the other hand, is the hall-mark of sin; the inability to sing the praise of God is the evidence of, and punishment for, disobedience to the Lord. Zechariah was struck dumb for his lack of belief in the promises of God, and his voice returned only when he had demonstrated his trust in the divine plan. His first act following his miraculous recovery was to praise God in song. Throughout the scriptures, inability to speak is proof of demonic possession: "Master, I have brought my son to you, there is a spirit of dumbness in him." The Psalms are forthright on the curse of silence. The inability to praise is equated with death; either a physical death - "In the grave, who can give thee thanks?" or the spiritual death of life in God "Unless the Lord had been my help, my soul had almost dwelt in silence."

To break forth in song is the natural response to God, who himself banishes silence: "Our God comes, he shall not keep silence." To faithful Jews, the need to sing was compelling. The very word 'Psalm' means a 'song', so that to our Jewish forebears, our taste for its spoken recitation is all but incomprehensible. To pray without music is to swim without water; you can't get anywhere, you lack the medium of motion. And so, whether in joy or sorrow, whether in the Temple in Jerusalem or in exile in Babylon, the People of God sang their way through the ages. Whatever the situation, prayer was always praise, and praise was always song. Music banished the silence of non-being; only music was worthy of God.

Perhaps it is the structure in music that allows it to be so creative, so filled with God. In itself, it bears the stamp of God - who is beyond all structure, all measure and definition, but who chose to enter into structure to share our human experience. In Jesus Christ, God took on form, structure, in order that we might hear his music. If the Incarnation makes visible the face of God, it also makes audible the sound of heaven. Music is our attempt to incarnate the praise of heaven, to echo on earth the song of the angels and saints. In music, our lips, unfettered, enflesh the continual chants of the angels, of St Cecilia and of all the saints in paradise, so that we may be one with them in proclaiming the praise and the glory of God.
