**Cardinal Herbert Vaughan** was the eldest of thirteen children: six sons became priests, three of them bishops, and all five daughters became nuns. Bernard, the Jesuit son, said of his mother that "she made heaven such a reality to us that we felt that we knew more about it, and liked it in a way far better even than our own home, where, until she died, her children were wildly, supremely happy". Herbert Vaughan was judged by his friends to be "about the handsomest man in England". He was a good shot and a sound horseman. But as a priest and bishop...[he] displayed an astonishing breadth of sympathy and unflagging apostolic zeal. He spent twenty years as bishop of Salford [and, then, against] his will succeeded his friend and mentor, Cardinal Manning, as Archbishop of Westminster...Westminster Cathedral is his personal achievement...For thirty-five years, he enjoyed a friendship of warm affection, unblemished purity, and practical collaboration with Lady Herbert of Lea, who after his death preserved his letters. He wrote to her almost every day. Below are two extracts from his letters to her.

"I am not surprised you have been going through a time of desolation and spiritual dryness. You will

have these periods, and they are useful to prove your love and the strength of grace acting upon a will that receives no support from the sensible affections. You must be very patient under it, and not for a moment subtract from prayer or give yourself more to activity in its place. We only said to trust Him more; to aid ourselves by reading and by prayer, and He will accomplish what is beyond our power to attain. I shall say Mass for you tomorrow, that we may both grow during the next year more and more fervent in His service, more and more dead to self, more and more purified from earthly motives, and more and more helpful to one another." (p. 137) *New Year's Eve, 1869*

"I received the last Sacraments on the 19 and thought St Joseph would have come for me, but he saw I was not ready then. Perhaps I may be on the 25 March - perhaps later. A good son delights to enjoy the presence of a good father, to share his company his interests and even his nature, and his happiness. We are always saying, 'Our Father who are in Heaven' and then secretly adding, 'but whatever you do, leave me where I am.' Do we believe? We weep and wail over the death of those we love, because we do not sensibly believe that they have gone home to their real Father and to all their best friends. Of course, I know that Our Father wishes us to do all we can by ordinary and natural means, to prolong our life of work and probation, and I have nothing to reproach myself with in this matter. I have got a good male nurse and every care needful. But a man over seventy has a right to look with a certain yearning towards the end. And we who are 'slaves' have our own little rights and hopes, which our Mother and St Joseph will keep an eye on...You may be sure if I get home before you, I will do more for you there than I ever could on earth." (p. 453) *22 March 1903. He died on 19 June 1903.*
