SAINTS THIS WEEK

ST TERESA OF AVILA 1515-82

MONDAY 15 OCTOBER

Teresa was born in 1515 and was 40 years of age
when she set out to reform the Carmelites, suffering
much frustration on the way. But she made it clear
that her reform wasn't to be measured only by
severer austerity and increased asceticism. For her,
inner conversion is marked by generosity, joy and the
flourishing of God's gifts and, for her, the only sure
evidence of growth in the mystical life is love of
neighbour. She said many remarkable things to her
sisters; but this one stands out: "Remember that you
have only one soul; that you have only one death to
die; that you have only one life, which is short and
has to be lived by you alone; and that there is only one
glory, which is eternal. If you remember this, there
will be many things about which you care nothing."
She died in 1582, was canonised 40 years later and, in
1970, was the first woman to be named a Doctor of
the Church.

ST IGNATIUS OF ANTIOCH AD 50-98/117

WEDNESDAY 17 OCTOBER

St Ignatius of Antioch (37-107), the earliest and most
important of the Apostolic Fathers and third bishop of
Antioch, was condemned to death and sent to Rome
to be thrown to the wild beasts in the amphitheatre.
His writings are among the earliest and richest sources
of teaching on the Church, the Holy Eucharist, and the
Sacrament of Orders, contained in seven letters
written to various churches on his journey to die in
Rome. But more important than his writings are his
deeds and principally his martyrdom. His martyrdom
speaks more eloquently than any words of his love for
Christ; and his love of Christ tells us more than any
text or treatise the most important thing we need to
know about the Church, the Holy Eucharist, and the
Sacrament of Orders.
